Message from Chairman of QESOSA and QESOSAEPO

Dear Schoolmates,

This is my fourth year serving as Chairman of QES Old Students' Association (OSA) and QESOSA Education Promotion Organization (EPO). I am grateful to the members of the 2 Executive Committees and the fellow old students. Without their dedicated support, OSA and EPO could not have achieved so much progress so smoothly in the past years.

The 2011 QESOSA AGM & Annual Dinner was held on 27 August 2011 at Regal Kowloon Hotel. Although the capacity of the venue was small, the spirit of our over 250 alumni and guests was high. Amongst chatters and laughters, alumni spend a memorable evening with friends new and old.

The QES Homecoming Day and the ball game tournaments have become the annual events of OSA. This year, the Homecoming Day was held on 17 March 2012. Besides folk dance, campus tour, exhibition by QES students, we also have a new booth "A Camp Day in School". Over 100 alumni, local and overseas, friends and families attended the function to share the school spirit.



As for the ball game tournaments, we have 11 teams of basketball and 16 teams of football joining the tournaments, making a sum of 270 players. The preliminary matches started in February 2012 and the finals took place on the Homecoming Day. With the growing popularity of the ball game tournaments, a Ball Game Sub-committee was set up to make sure that the tournaments are well taken care of.

OSA continued to work closely with Queen Elizabeth School (QES) in support of the development of our alma mater. In the QES Alumni Mentorship Programme, we have 53 old students serving as mentors sharing their experience with 300 QES students. The Kick-off Ceremony for the Programme was held on 15 October 2011.

In order to better coordinate the effort of our alumni on the School Camp improvement projects, OSA set up a School Camp Sub-committee. The Sub-committee has started on surveying and fencing the boundary of the Camp, fixing the dormitory, and planning to build a new road to access to the Camp. Theme camp and other activities were organized to highlight the education functions of the Camp. The School will be celebrating the 50th Anniversary of the School Camp on 22 September 2012. Come join the Celebration and see the School Camp for yourself.

After serving QES for 4 successful years, Principal Tong Kwok Keung will retire on 31 August, 2012. It has been a pleasurable experience working with Principal Tong. Under the able leadership of Principal Tong, a number of initiatives proposed by OSA were made possible, namely the 55th Anniversary fundraising campaign and the turning of Homecoming Day and ball game tournaments into regular annual events. All these strengthen the relationship between QES and OSA. On behalf of OSA and in my own name, I would like to express our heartfelt thanks to Principal Tong for his contributions.

Message from QES Principal

Thoughts at random, fond memories



My recollections of the past four years as Principal at QES have been woven with fond memories centered among the people I met – colleagues, students, alumni and parents.

Whenever people asked me where I work, I often take pride in a reply saying that at QES and go further to elaborate that it is a quality education school with quality educated teachers and quality educated students.

As the school's 60th Anniversary heralds in, QES is relatively young among the prestigious schools in Hong Kong; however, it has made a name for itself since its foundation years under the tender care and nurturing of our former visionary principals and colleagues. Our prominent alumni working in different respectable

professions and in the civil service have manifested the school motto in their work performance and made valuable contributions to society. Besides, for her school mission, school ethos, committed staff and graduates' scholastic achievements, the school is held in high esteem by members of the community and much sought after by parents who are eager to entrust their children's education to us. QES has always been a school where children are nurtured into young responsible adults with admirable character and scholastic achievements.

Four years ago, I was highly privileged to have been appointed Principal of the school and honored to have been trusted by the EDB to hold the helm of this renowned vessel. As QES is an established school with a glorious past, it is not without pressure for me, as a baton-catcher in a relay race, to sustain the edge my predecessors have achieved in school development not to mention scale new heights. As well-wished by my former colleagues and acquaintances, I truthfully enjoy working here with different stakeholders, who have offered me their cooperation and support. Though there are hurdles that have to be straddled during the course, I am grateful to them. Here, I hesitate to mention them individually by name as it will be utterly unfair to leave out or overlook any one.

In the school, I have very devoted colleagues who are very hardworking. The senior managers are well experienced and helpful in channeling my vision to the middle managers and getting them organized in making team effort. The middle managers inclusive of the heads of subject departments and the leaders of functional teams have demonstrated good leadership in leading their respective members in the implementation of the school development plan and subject programme plans and ensuring the alignment of effort. The teachers are conscientious and enthusiastic about their duties, working with students' welfare at heart.

The PTA of the school is well appreciated for their generous support in terms of finance and effort. They sponsor the scholarships for students and the operation expenses of the school camp as well as the special learning programmes such as the school orchestra. Their participation in school functions and service as volunteers on major school occasions have provided the school with moral support.

The OSA deserves my heartfelt gratitude for its reciprocal contribution to the school. It effectively coordinates the old students, integrate them and channel their expertise in helping with initiatives such as the Education Promotion Organization, the Alumni Mentorship Programme, the Homecoming Day and the School Camp renovation work. Their reciprocating acts bear testimony to the success of school education and manifestation of the school motto: Vos Parate Ut Serviates (Prepare yourself that you may serve). Their strong sense of belonging to the school, pride in being graduates of QES, close ties among members of the same Form Association as well as longitudinally among the different FAs, unstinting support to the school and their younger brothers and sisters are all commendable.

Our students are all loveable. Though I often cherish the chance of visiting classes and conducting lessons, I couldn't afford the time due to the hectic administration work. Notwithstanding, I treasure every chance meeting them after lesson time on campus and on major school functions. They have impressed me as well-mannered, intelligent, humble, modest, dynamic and bright students. They take pride in their school and display confidence in their leadership and organization skills in serving their peers and assuming duties as School Prefects, Big Brothers and Sisters, School Camp Wardens, House Captains, and others. They are capable learners reaping pleasant results in pubic examinations and showing good organization skills and leadership, too.

The ancillary staff has also rendered invaluable support to maintaining the school's tidiness and making systematic and efficient seating arrangements for public examinations and major school functions. They are dedicated people and display conscientiousness about work and care for students.

Besides people, there are occasions that imprint vivid memories on my mind.

On the first day of school in the first school year that I arrived, the school hall was still under renovation and thus not accessible for the new school term school assembly. It would be inappropriate not to have a school assembly at the start of a new school term, coupled with the appointment of a new principal. Arrangements were thus made immediately for the school assembly to be conducted at the open playground. Students and teachers assembled and I, standing on a choir riser stand, addressed the school. It should be the first time in recent school history to have an assembly conducted as such. Besides introducing myself to the students, I elaborated on the ABC to success and advised them to Aim high, Balance work and play and make

Continued effort. The school hall renovation work was eventually completed in December. Had it not been for the contingency arrangement, I would only be able to address the school in December, three months after the start of the new school term.

The school football pitch, a much admired infrastructure at QES and in Mongkok, was completely overhauled with the support of the Architectural Services Department(Arch SD). Formerly covered in weeds and in a state of unwanted wear, the football pitch became a pleasant place for student activities on work completion.

The tall trees on the school campus are aged more than twenty years. They have witnessed batches of students develop and school development. Amidst the several tropical cyclones that hit the territory in the school year 2009-2010, quite a few very tall trees yielded to the typhoons blown at gale force. They had to be felled eventually. It was disheartening to see them being sawed and removed.

Another spectacular occasion was the celebration of the school's 55th Anniversary. The multifarious events such as the Homecoming Day, the 100-table Chinese Banquet, the unveiling of the School Commemorative Plaques, the Fiesta of Expression and the Distinguished Alumni Talks were all successfully organized showcasing the collaborative effort of students, alumni, parents and teachers.

The adverse weather conditions in the school year 2010-2011 were tests on our contingency planning. The Swimming Gala and the Sports Day (Heats) had to be cancelled on site. Though reluctant, we had to call off the school functions in the interest of students' safety. We were thrown into a state of despair, as finding a fall-back date was generally impossible when it came to booking of public sporting venues. Fortunately, we were blessed with the good news from the venue managers that respective much sought after time slots were available for us to hold the functions. It was gratifying and amazing.

The power failure, caused by the underground faulty electricity supply cable, happened during the scorching summer months was another unforgettable experience for all. We had to endure working, teaching or learning in oven-like classrooms. The piled up heat, the stuffy air and the mounting discontent among students made the situation more unbearable. Perhaps our students are spoilt having been able to enjoy the fruit of modern invention and getting intolerant of deprivation and inconvenience.

The completion of the refurbishment work at the School Annexe, down the drive-way, provides the school with much needed space for implementation of the New Senior Secondary Curriculum as well as promotion of activities such as audio and visual film recording. Again, the personnel of the ArchSD deserved our appreciation for their assistance in interior design.

I have been going at lengths with a recollection of memorable events which come to my mind like flashbacks in a film. I am equally impressed by the effort and performance of our colleagues and students in many other events such as the Christmas Concert, the Class Dance, the Cheering Teams, the Fiesta of Expression, the Homecoming Days, the Open Days, the Singing Contests, the Forums, the Inter-GSS Debating Competitions, the School Camp and the FA Farewell Gatherings. Happy faces, laughter, joy, fun and excitement are vivid in my memories.

On school campus, I enjoy watching our students engaging in learning while attending lessons and playing ball games on the playground during recesses and after school hours. Their enthusiasm and total involvement impress me. It is pleasing to note how well our students behave on hearing the ringing of the school bell signifying the beginning of a lesson. They immediately wrap up their ball games and walk swiftly back to their respective classrooms. Our school Discipline Committee is highly effective

The implementation of the New Senior Secondary Curriculum and the introduction of the HK Diploma of Secondary Education (HKDSE) in recent years have posed great challenge to the school administrators, teachers, students and their parents. All need to adapt to the change and map out strategies to cope with the new teaching syllabus, the examination requirement, the school-based assessment and the teaching time constraint. The school year 2011-2012, being the double cohort year, found our S7 students and S6 students busy preparing themselves for the last HKAL Examination and the first HKDSE Examination respectively. Thanks to our colleagues' dedication and professional handling of duties, students' anxiety is seen eased and students get well prepared for the public examination.

As the School Camp will be celebrating its 50th Anniversary in September 2012, planning work has been under way to improve on the infrastructure and mark the school camp boundary. Thanks are due to those who have been actively involved inclusive of the OSA, the PTA, the Old Warden Association, the CWA and colleagues.

At the close of the school year 2011-2012, the school draws up its next 3-year School Development Plan. Our major concerns are (a) to enhance teachers' effectiveness in facilitating students' academic pursuit and whole person development and (b) to nurture students into confident and self-directed learners. Students will be nurtured into learners with TOP skills and eventually become top students with an enhanced performance in academic pursuits and whole person development contributing to making QES a top school. The TOP skills include the practice of Target setting, Opportunities seizing and Preparedness fostering.

At the school year end, I shall be leaving QES on retirement, after years of hard work. I embrace the opportunities that it offers me in taking a respite, enriching myself, charting a new course and enjoying life. I treasure the experience and joy that working at QES has given me and the friendship that has been made with our colleagues, students, alumni and parents that I have the privilege to meet. Fond memories will forever be imprinted on my mind.

In closing, I thank QES for having provided me with opportunities to practise my education philosophy and sincerely wish that our school will forever be achieving in providing quality education to our future generations.

The Kick-off Ceremony of the Programme was held on 15 October 2011. Mentors and mentees made use of the occasion for ice-breaking and to know one another better.



Social Service Project 2011-2012 善群行動







Remembering Mr. Terry Chamberlain

I first met Mr. Chamberlain in 1955 when he arrived in Hong Kong to join the staff of Queen Elizabeth School.

Mr. Cheong Wai Fung, the Principal of QES, asked me to meet him and to see that he settled down in the hotel to which he had been allocated until he could find government quarters. In fact I did not need to do more than welcome him as his elder brother, who worked in the Public Works Department, was there to meet him. I invited him to my home with his wife and children for lunch a few days later and thereafter we became good friends, a friendship which lasted long after we had left Hong Kong.

Mr. Chamberlain soon proved to be an excellent teacher of Mathematics and a valuable colleague who established friendly relationships with both students and colleagues. A keen hockey player and for many years a stalwart of the Hong Kong hockey team, he introduced hockey to the school and soon recruited an enthusiastic team of hockey players. He was not only a gifted teacher and sportsman but an outstanding educator, concerned about the development of his students as people, not only as students who passed their examinations.

After a few years in QES Mr. Chamberlain was transferred to Northcote Training College (later renamed College of Education), but then in 1967 he returned to QES as Principal when I was transferred to be Principal of Northcote. I was sad at leaving QES but was delighted that he was to take my place, knowing that the school was in good hands. I was disappointed when only three years later he was moved from QES to be the Principal of Sir Robert Black College of Education, yet this had fruitful results for the Colleges. Thanks to our eagerness to co-operate and our friendship with the Principal of Grantham College of Education, Mr. Kwok Wai Man, also a former teacher at QES, we were able to introduce valuable improvements in the Colleges, particularly in the method of selecting students. We then did this jointly instead of each College conducting its own separate selection procedure. Moreover, in our meetings in the Education Department we were able to speak with one voice, having decided beforehand on our policy. After Mr. Chamberlain and later I retired we remained in close touch. He and his wife stayed with us in Vienna and we with them in England and later, when he became ill, I was able to visit him a few times. Mr. Chamberlain contributed much to education in Hong Kong and, through his personality, enriched the lives of those who came in contact with him. I am grateful to have had the privilege of knowing him.

I was one of those students who did not have the privilege to have Mr. Chamberlain as a teacher in any classes throughout our six years in QES from 1957 to 1963 (those of us in Form 2A, 3A, 4A, 5A, Lower 6B, and Upper 6B). Nevertheless, Mr. Chamberlain was well respected among us.

It was a well known fact that Mr. Chamberlain was not only systematic and methodical in his teachings, he was also very patient, always focused on the good quality aspects of his students and gave them his whole-hearted encouragements. He would generously give partial credits for unsolved mathematics exam problems for trying. It was said that he would give students some points for just drawing a circle.

As mentioned by Max that Mr. Chamberlain sincerely cared about not only the academic developments of his

students, but also their extra-curricular activities. He started the Student Astronomy and Meteorology Club. In a small corner of the school bulletin board, he regularly posted weekly weather forecasts including wind directions and radar reports to arouse student interest.

Mr. Chamberlain was tall, handsome and masculine in his physical appearance. However, he was a very gentle, polite and humble human being. Regardless of if he knew you or not, he always greeted everyone with a warm and unpretentious smile. On one of the excursions he organized to the Royal Observatory, he accidentally dropped onto the floor a piece of equipment which he was explaining to his students. Although the equipment was not damaged, he immediately apologized to the official in front of the students. These were his exact words, "I have disgraced myself for not being more careful. Please forgive me for my clumsiness."

In those days, we had our final exams at the end of June every year. After the exams and before the report cards were being given out, there was a two-week period that the students were on self study while the teachers were busy marking the exam papers. To keep the students in good spirit and engage them in healthy physical exercises, Mr. Chamberlain always took upon himself the extra work in organizing soccer matches among the classes. He acted as the referee for every game.

You could not help feeling a pain deep in your heart seeing Mr. Chamberlain running continuously, game after game, under the scorching summer sun. His tall features all covered with sweat from head to toe. I just could not stand on the sideline and watch him working so hard to the brink of exhaustion for the good of his students. He appreciated it when I offered to relieve him as the referee for some of the games.

In spite of his overpowering physical features, he was exceptionally kind and mellow at heart. Once he ran into a group of four or five students gambling in card games after school hours. Instead of scolding them, he in no uncertain terms explained diplomatically to them that gambling was a violation of school rules and could have serious consequences. After getting their words that they would do no such things again, Mr. Chamberlain also assured them that they did not need to worry about that particular instance, as he would not report it to the school by treating it as only their first and last violation.

I have an ever-lasting prominent impression of Mr. Chamberlain. It was our school speech day. The Governor of Hong Kong Sir Robert Black was at the school giving the speech and presenting prizes to the top students. Mr. Chamberlain was helping in passing out the prizes. Here stood a tall, handsome and masculine teacher dressed in his black university scholar gown lined with snow white fur.

Mr T. McC. Chamberlain – A Caring and Inspiring Teacher

On a cold QES school day in 1960, our chemistry teacher was absent, and a tall, dark and handsome English gentleman took his place. As soon as he came into the classroom, he announced: "Mr Chan is ill today. I will be looking after you for this period. I'll let you do your own work. Meanwhile, you can ask me any question on mathematics." That marked the beginning of the first time I encountered Mr Chamberlain closely. Of course, I had seen Mr Chamberlain before in school, but always at a distance. Anyway, as a 14-year old student hardly able to utter a complete sentence in English and not exactly known for any outstanding achievement, academic or otherwise, I would be far too intimidated to talk to any teacher who did not know me, let alone to a "gwailo". However, on this day, maybe it was because of his mild and friendly manner, or maybe it was his beautifully enunciated English, or maybe it was his smile, I picked up the courage to ask him a question. In those days, I had a passion for Euclidean geometry

and of course I would ask the one problem I thought was the toughest and would show off my special way of solving it. He was extremely patient with my pidgin English and listened really attentively to every point I made until he fully understood what I was doing. With a smile, he complimented my efforts. Then, bit by bit, he told me why some of my assumptions were wrong, and how those led to wrong conclusions. I was stupefied by the speed with which he found the errors in what I thought a profound and rigorous proof. The ensuing discussion was humbling for me, however, I was very much encouraged by his kind and generous commendations.

The following year, we were confronted with the first big academic hurdle – the School Certificate Examination. I was blessed to have Mr Chamberlain as our mathematics teacher. (I also learned that several of the girls in my class did not really like mathematics, but took the subject because of Mr Chamberlain's striking handsomeness. To the disappointment of many, he grew a big beard which covered up much of his good looks later that year!) Handsome or not, he was one hell of a teacher! He was exceptionally lucid in his explanations, always trying to arouse our interest by drawing analogies to everyday events and to consolidate our understanding by representing the mathematical concept with a diagram. (To this day, I still practise these good habits of his in my lectures.) Even on a boring subject like stock and shares and interest rates, he would make it vivacious and colourful!

During that year, together with some other teachers, Mr Chamberlain established the QES Science Club. I was keen to join several of the sections including Astronomy and Meteorology, both led by Mr Chamberlain. It was during that time I heard someone saying that Mr Chamberlain was once the Deputy Director of the Observatory. I never confirmed with him on that, but after consulting with Mr Hinton who was not too sure about that either, we concluded that must be the time right after the war when he was still serving in the army. Regardless, somehow, Mr Chamberlain managed to borrow from somewhere a high-power reflective telescope for us to view the heavenly bodies. (Later, under his supervision, we actually made one ourselves.) The excitement of a bunch of teenage students seeing for the first time the surface of Jupiter, or the details of the rings around Saturn could hardly be contained. I still remember when Mr Chamberlain explained to us that the image of the Andromeda Galaxy we were viewing at the time was in fact its image approximately two and a half million years ago, I was struck with such an aura of mystery that I felt completely lost in a daze, bewildered by the incomprehensible vastness of the Universe. We spent many, many late nights in the football field gazing at and learning about the planets, the stars, and the galaxies. He also spent a few weekends taking us to visit the Hong Kong Royal Observatory in Tsim Sha Tsui. Besides academic work, Mr Chamberlain was also a keen sportsman, having great enthusiasm for (field) hockey and cricket. (He even gave me a few tips in boxing once!)

The year after the School Cert Exam found us all facing another big hurdle – matriculation. We did not have Mr Chamberlain for mathematics any more, but his care for our learning continued to touch us. At the end of our Form Lower 6, he volunteered to spend the summer with us giving us tutorials on calculus and analytic geometry. In those days, it was every parent's dream to get his/her son into medical school in Hong Kong. My parents were no exception. However, the tutorials that summer changed my mind. In spite of my parents' wish, I totally turned away from biological sciences, and took up mathematical sciences for my career instead. Today, 50 years later, mathematics remains the prime tool for my scientific research and my interest in it is still as fervent!

I saw Mr Chamberlain for the last time in 1966 just before I left Hong Kong for England. He was about to take up his post in Northcote Training College. He explained to me at length on the education system in England. Even though I never saw him again, for over 45 years, whenever I thought of my old school days, Mr Chamberlain would be one of the first teachers that came to my mind. It is very sad for me to hear that he had passed away. To me, he was more than a great teacher; he was an inspiring figure, be that in or out of the classroom. His unparalleled dedication to the education of his students will remain deeply imprinted in my heart, and no doubt, in the hearts of many as well.

Fifty Years

Fifty years is half a century. It was about this time, half a century ago, that we received our Hong Kong School Certificates – all 127 of us, constituting the class of 1961 (61FA), Queen Elizabeth School. We reached a major turning point in our lives. Less than half stayed on for two more matriculation years leading to university. Others went on to vocational or professional training, before joining the work force. Still others started working right away. That was a time when farewells at the Kai Tak Airport, for the lucky few embarking on studies overseas, were fairly frequent events. The farewell scenes on board the S.S. President Cleveland and S.S. President Wilson were most unforgettable. The romance of friends sailing across the Atlantic, to the far away New World, cast lasting memories on our impressionable young minds.

The Class of 61 is now mostly retired grandparents. They have left their marks in life-long professional careers, as academics, and as leaders of business, industry, and government services. They are scattered all over the world. Sadly, a few have passed away. For ten days in November, 2011, some of us gathered in Hong Kong for our 50th anniversary reunion. It was an experience of a life time. It certainly warrants a brief account for all, especially those who were not able to attend all or part of the activities.

The Reunion Week kicked off on November 2nd, with a lunch at the New Century Plaza, right next to QES. There was a good attendance of about 40, in an electrified atmosphere filled with the excitement of lost friends seeing each other again for the first time since school, and of old friends simply not seeing each other frequently enough. Yelling of old nicknames filled the room; there was so much catching up on the past time.

A short walk to QES, through the soccer field back-gate, followed. Camera clicking intensified on the way, as we tried to capture the look of our school today. Memories of our youth of yesteryears gradually emerged. The two Assistant Principals, Mr. Tam and Mr. Tse, and the Career Mistress, Mrs. Liu, together with other staff members, gave us a welcome with the full treatment, which included a commentated video of today's QES, as well as archived pictures featuring most of us. Shouts like "THAT'S ME, third one left on the second row!" were repeatedly yelled out many times, with the same teenage passion and enthusiasm of fifty years ago. Look at those handsome lads with their full heads of hair, and the pretty girls with not a blemish on their faces. Yes indeed, memories are made of these. The visit was concluded with a fully guided tour of the school, the new wing, the new facilities, the whole works

In the evening, small groups gathered for an intimate dinner. These were precious moments, especially for those who would not be able to attend the main event coming up on November 4th.

Thursday November 3rd greeted us with beautiful weather, giving us a perfect day for our outing to Lamma Island. Most of the 30 of us made the two-hour walking tour from Yung Shue Wan to Sok Ku Wan, where we had an excellent seafood lunch at the famous Rainbow Restaurant. While the majority stayed for a tour of the Lamma Fisherfolk's Village, which is highly interesting and educational, a few rushed back to town for a "mahjong tournament".

The big day finally came. Friday November 4th started with a Yaumati Form 1 Reunion Lunch at the Commissioners Club of the Scout Association of Hong Kong. There were only a few new faces, as most had gone on to QES after Yaumati. The 35 in attendance pretty much had an encore of the lunch two days ago, with the same excitement and enthusiasm.

Soon after the lunch, people started moving straight to the Shatin Jockey Club. It didn't take long for the mahjong tables to fill up. The video and slide shows ran non-stop. The wine started to flow. Music of the early sixties filled the rooms, only to be interrupted by the karaoke songbirds. The evening was informal but elegant, structured yet

congenial. The resolution to make a commemorative video was quickly adopted. The speeches were short and heartfelt. After fifty years, fifty of us had a hell of a party.

As the cliché goes: Never in the history of QES 61FA had so many owe so much to so few. These so few are: Brenda Cheng, Y.K. Chan, Robert Ho, Robin Luk, Ko Yuk Yee, Nancy Lau, Susan Leung, Diana Chan, Wong Wah Kay, and others whom we might have missed or who simply worked behind the scene.

Y.K. and Mimi Chan enriched the reunion programme by arranging a 52 ft. yacht for a boat ride on Sunday, retracing our canoe trip in the summer of 1961. The veterans of that pioneering excursion of so long ago, and the people taking the upcoming Sanya-Vietnam cruise, were invited to the Chans' residence Saturday evening, for dinner and pre-trip warm-up and planning. No more needs to be said about their extraordinary hospitality.

The half-day boat trip was every bit as adventurous as our seven-day canoe trip in the summer of 1961. The open sea was rough, and it was probably the last chance of the season for such a trip. On Oct 2, 2011, the Canadian Breast Cancer Foundation celebrated its 25th anniversary, and I joined the QESOSA Ontario Team to walk at the foundation's annual Run for the Cure event. This was the first time I had ever been at the event, and I would like to share with you some of my thoughts

The day was grey, and the sky was thick with heavy clouds. The overcast gave way to light showers, which occasionally turned into large drops of rain; there were whispers of snowflakes.

Yet the atmosphere was elating and upbeat, among all shades of pink. We could see pink hats, shirts, scarves, bandanas, ties, gloves, pants, socks, sneakers, umbrellas, as well as a cement truck! Blowing in the wind was a sense

of somberness and hope - 'somber' in the sense of the graveness of the decease, which has challenged so many families, and has claimed so many lives, and 'hope' in the sense that breast cancer survival rates continue to climb, and a full cure is in sight.

As we reached the event site, we saw big crowds of men and women - young and old, and of many different ethnicities; there were even babies in strollers. People gathered in the school hall, congregated on the open ground, and continuingly streamed in from the car park nearby.

I had learnt about this event at the OSA spring function. Our new Director Karen Kwok, Captain of the QESOSA Ontario Team, initiated our participation in this Run for the Cure. She brought along her hubby, who acted as our (un)official photographer. Our team also had our own chauffeurs, Chan Chi-Hung and Leung Yat-To, taking us to the event site from our gathering spot.

In the spirit of our school motto of contributing to the community, Barbara Yang, our President, had led us through to this event, this time for a cause that is very much worthy of our time and effort. Our founding President, James Tang, commented that it had been almost twenty years since QESOSA Ontario participated in United Way's Walkathon at the Toronto harbour.

To my greatest surprise, the pledge letter, which I had sent to my friends on my return home just 10 days before the walk, generated great responses. I am forever grateful to my friends' and family's charity spirit.

Two days before the walk, my physiotherapist who had been treating my hip pain gave me the go-ahead, but cautioned me to take it easy - walk, don't run!

I kudo to my school friend Anita Chu, who is a QESOSA Ontario member now living in sunny California. She had just got off a redeye flight to Toronto for a family gathering, and bravely came straight from the airport to join her sister Irene Ho and the QESOSA Ontario Team for the Run. At the 1 Km point, we were given a choice of continuing on, or turning back, i.e. to brave the cold and rain for the remaining 4 Km, or to quit right there and then. The choice was easy!

We walked through highways, on country roads, and through a park with a beautiful garden, a waterfall, a gazebo, and a bridge over running a stream. Our team reached the finish line in just one hour.

The team gave up the goodies offered at the reception tent at the event site and opted for a dim sum lunch with our very own QES cheering team, headed by our VP, S.K. Tang.

We were a relatively small team, but we exceeded our fundraising goal of \$1,000.00 by a huge margin. The total funds raised for the Run was well over \$3.000.00.

QESOSA Tong Kwok Wah Secondary School started supporting the Capacity Building Mileage Programme (CBMP) in 2008. This community programme aims to encourage women to improve their all round ability as individuals, and help remove environmental barriers and provide opportunities for women to build up their capacities. In 2011-2012, 5 courses were offered. Among the 77 participants enrolled in the Programme, 21 were parents of EPO schools students.

QESOSA EPO has set up a scholarship (家長互助互學獎勵計劃) for EPO school parents to encourage them to set a role model for their children in life long learning. Parents who enroll in and complete the CBMP courses will receive the scholarship. This year, 11 participants were awarded the scholarship. Since the introduction of the Programme, 330 participants have been awarded the scholarship with a cumulated amount of \$66,000.







QESOSA Education Services – Elder Academy

The QESOSA Education Centre Elder Academy was established in 2007 with the support of QESOSA Secondary School (QOS). Teachers, students and parents of QOS as well as volunteers and staff from social service agencies participated actively to make the Elder Academy a success. The Elder Academy offered a total of 7 courses in the year 2011-2012, with over 130 elders enrolling in the programme.

A survey was conducted after each semester to collect feedback from the elders on the quality of the courses offered. For the last three semesters, the elders highly rated the programme, particularly, the performance of the instructors and the overall logistics of the programme.

In the past year, 3 elders received the Silver Certificate (over 30 learning hours) and 21 elders received the Bronze Certificate (over 20 learning hours) awarded by the Elderly Commission.









Elder Academy Choir

The Elder Academy Choir has been set up for 4 years. Last year the Choir performed at 5 different occasions: QOS Christmas Concert (7 December 2011) 'Christmas Greetings' at Hong Kong International Airport Arrivals Hall (22 December 2011), 『傑義風采喜迎春2012』 of Pok Oi Hospital, Yuen Yuen Institute and Yan Oi Tong (22 February, 2012), 『博愛醫院長者夢想成真計劃』 (26 February, 2012) and 『伊家共聚嘉年華』 (19 May, 2012) of 伊家人 of QESOSAEPO joint school PTAs.

Eco-tour

Tung Ping Chau tour (東平洲導賞)

On 8 October 2011, a group of 27 elders was guided by QOS students to Tung Ping Chau to observe its unique geomorphology and rich ecological resources. In this eco-tour trip, QOS students also presented the history and some special structures of Tung Ping Chau to the elders. Thereby, the elders gained an in-depth understanding about Tung Ping Chau.





Luk Keng tour (鹿頸導賞)

Luk Keng, located at North-East New Territories and near the Frontier Closed Area, has rich biodiversity because development is limited by its location. On 30 June 2012, a group of QOS students led 15 elders to Luk Keng for an eco-tour to observe the behavior of butterflies, dragonflies and wet land birds, they also introduce the culture and history of Luk Keng to the elders. The elders did not only enrich their observation skills, but also become more familiar with the culture of Luk Keng and its surrounding areas.

一條龍銜接

伊中舊生會中小學「一條龍」政策已於2011年9月正式落實。這些年來,無論辦學團體、四校的校長和老師都積極為一條龍政策進行了大量的工作,除了一條龍督導委員會定期開會制訂有關政策詳情、措施和程序外,亦全面監察和支援有關政策、措施和程序的進展。在全體同工的努力下,得到家長和同學的支持

和信任,本年度有88%的畢業同學直接升讀本會的兩所中學,而當中有68%被評估為第一組別的同學選擇留在我們的一條龍系統內,成績令人相當鼓舞。我們相信一條龍的辦學模式能為學生提供十二年一貫的基礎和中學教育,有利於學生的全面發展,培養「修己善群」的精神。

學校亦因應一條龍政策而與本會其他三所學校共同制訂和推行優才發展課程(資優教育課程),分別有英文科、數學科和科學科,讓小學五、六年級在不同學習領域具有高能力的學生參加,有關課程獲得學生和家長廣泛的歡迎,亦有助鼓勵能力高的學生留在一條龍的系統。除此之外,透過由屬會中學舉辦的濕地考察





活動、陶藝工作坊、數學遊戲工作坊、英文科大型遊戲日及中國文化日等活動,增強中小學之間的溝通和合作,讓我們的學生早日認識我們的中學。首屆一條龍的學生能夠銜接暢順,除了以上的配套產生效用外,一連串由中學提供的暑期銜接課程及活動及早加強對學生的瞭解,亦能對個別學生提供適切的學習支援。



學與教

學與教是學校最核心的工作,因此亦是學校長期的核心發展項目。 本年度我們的老師積極參加各種進修和專業發展活動。我們透過各種觀 課、集體備課、合作學習、教學行動研究、校內和校外的教學分享及交 流等活動,推動教師專業發展和能力的提升。我們亦邀請學務總監徐蔚 玲校長到本校進行課堂質素及觀課後議課的分析,協助改善及發展課堂 教學,提升學與教效能。

另一方面,鑑於本區學生的家

教師專業發展

過去一年,學校在教職員的努力下,得到家長的 支持和信任,共同協力為同學營造積極、正面和關懷 的學習環境,不論在正規課程、延展課程以及教師專 業發展方面,均取得良好的成績,現簡略報告如下:

正規課程方面

為使「合作學習」的教學模式更具成效,本校銳意培養學生的學習習慣,以奠定更穩固的學習基礎。此外,中文科推行寫作課程改革,除了編訂小一至小六的縱向寫作課程外,更透過教師共同備課,製作校本教材,通過系統性的教學方法,以讀帶寫,進行即場寫作,並在同儕互評,教師的評講下,提升同學的



寫作能力。而同學們在全港即場中文寫作比賽中獲得多個優異獎,更有一位同學獲得特級優異獎,令同學的 寫作水平得到肯定。英文科方面,小一至小三推行PLPRW計劃,以生動有趣的方法,訓練同學的讀寫能力。

高年級在教育局校本支援計劃的專業指導下,加強對學生的閱讀策略及寫作訓練,同學在全港即場英文寫作比賽獲七項優異獎,更因中英文寫作均表現出色,因而獲學校團體獎。

我們的數學科一向重視發展同學的邏輯思維、分析和解難能力,學生成績一 向優異。本年度同學參加了多項公開校際數學比賽,成績驕人,包括:三位同學獲 「華夏盃」全國數學奧林匹克2012香港賽區一等獎,三位同學獲世界數學測試優

等獎,其中一位同學更獲邀參加世界數學測試精英邀請賽,更脫穎而出,獲小學組金獎,成績令人欣喜。

正因為同學在學術上獲得全面的培養,有鞏固的根基,因此在各方面均有發展均匀而傑出的成就。本年度,本校同學在各項傑出學生選舉中大放異彩,包括三位同學囊括「天水圍的孩子」獎勵計劃中的「自強孩子」、「才藝孩子」及「卓越孩子」三項大獎。另外一位同學入選第六屆元朗區十大傑出小學生選舉,這已是本校第五次獲獎。同時,另一位同學亦入選元朗區小學校長會主辦的元朗區傑出小學生。此外,兩位同學入選「閃耀之星」,分別奪得體育才能及全面才華大獎,成為傳媒追訪對象。



延展課程方面

學校的延展課程目標是「擴闊視野,追求卓越」。我們為同學提供多元化的學習經歷,培養他們在不同領域的興趣及專長,發展個人潛能。

本年度共有超過900人次參加不同類型的比賽及活動,包括學術、視覺藝術、音樂及體育等範疇,並取得突破性的成績。

在藝術方面,本校繼續舉辦伊分管弦樂團,刻意栽培同學音樂潛能。此外,為讓在不同藝術領域具天份的同學有一展身手的機會,學校利用伊分電視台播放「才藝一分鐘」節目,讓同學可以在校園電視中成為一分鐘的明星,顯露才華。學期終結時,全校同學更可投票選出最受歡迎的節目,氣氛熱烈,而最難得的是有個別成績一般甚至稍遜的同學,也有機會成為全校焦點,贏得掌聲,重拾自信。至於綜合才藝表演,更成為每年度的盛事,接待校內同學、家長及校外幼稚園家長共超過七百多人,參與各項演出的同學累計超過五百人次。

在視覺藝術方面,同學在多項全港性的填色、繪畫及設計比賽獲冠 亞軍獎項。在小學生「愛童孩」白飯魚設計比賽中分別勇奪高級組全港 亞軍及初級組全港亞軍,其作品均獲大會製成展品,在全港巡迴展覽。 在舞蹈方面,有多位同學在社交舞勇奪多項冠軍,其中兩位同學更在第 四十八屆學校舞蹈節比賽中獲牛仔舞甲級獎。

在體育方面,學校自建造標準跳遠跑道和沙池後,跳遠訓練更為專業化,同學屢創佳績,多位男女同學除在元朗區運動會中奪得跳遠冠亞軍外,一位六年級女同學更以4米88的佳績打破小學組香港女子學界紀錄,因而成為傑出運動員,更代表香港出外交流。學校自成立小網訓練班後,亦人才輩出,多位一至三年級男女同學分別在小型網球分區校際賽中獲冠亞季軍,而其中一位二年級同學更勇奪全港週年錦標賽女子八歲組冠軍。我校的體操隊除在體操比賽上多次獲團體優異成績外,亦參加元朗博愛醫院主辦的全港啦啦隊比賽,獲銀獎及最佳口號獎。

同學能在課外活動方面取得卓越的成就,實有賴教師團隊的承擔與 努力、家長們的鼎力支持、與及同學們的積極參與。

教師專業發展方面

本年度,學校進一步優化教學,除積極開發新課程及優化原有課程外,亦致力研討如何透過「合作學習」及蓋聶的課堂教學理論,提升教學效能。此外,學校亦繼續發揮資訊科技的優勢,令課堂的效率得以提升。為配合課程發展,本校亦致力進行教師專業發展,包括安排教師到友校觀摩,參加外籍英語教師計劃、校本支援計劃、內地教師支援計劃

等。就因為本校中文、英文及資訊科技教學出色,先後獲教育局元朗分區及基督教宣道會徐澤林紀念小學邀請分享電子白板教學,又獲教育局課程發展處邀請外借英文科科主任到內地支援當地英語教學。學校又先後與本地及湖南、順德等地的教育部門及小學分享校本課程。此外,為讓本地同工及家長更了解學校教學策略,先後舉行公開視窗及開放課堂觀課超過二十多次,獲得一致好評,亦令教師們專業發展獲得提升。

過去一年,學校在良好和穩健的基礎上,進一步提升學與教的水平,令學生有更全面的發展。從小一收生情況,家長的口碑,反映出區內家長對學校的支持和信任。家長一直都是學校的合作夥伴,也是學校的重要資源,我們十多位家長理事,以及近百位家長義工,為學校、學生勞心勞力,付出時間和精神,讓同學經歷多姿多采的校園生活,謹此向他們衷心致謝。

最後,多謝教師和職工團隊的努力和付出,致力營造一個整潔、舒適、安全、講求效率的學習環境,讓同學可以感受到正面、積極、關懷的學校文化,並健康和愉快地成長。

QESOSA Secondary School 2011-2012 School Report

Staff Strength

In order to meet with the special need in the "double-cohort" year, the teaching staff strength reached a historical high of 80. In addition to the standard establishment under the Code of Aid, our school was able to secure other funds to recruit 16 additional teachers. Among the teaching staff, 46% held higher degrees while the other 54% were degree holders. 95% have been professionally trained. All teachers of English Language and Putonghua have met the requirements of the Language Proficiency Assessment.

Public Examinations Result

Students had good performance in the 2012 Hong Kong Hong Kong Diploma of Secondary Education (HKDSE) Examination. Among the 189 students, 53.4% met the general entrance requirements for local four-year undergraduate university programmes. 94.7% met the general entrance requirements for sub-degree programmes. The average passing rate (attaining level 2 or above) was 97.3%. 8 subjects got 100% passed and the passing rates of 10 other subjects were over 90%. All subjects got passing rates higher than the Hong Kong norms. The average credit rate (attaining level 4 or above) was 42.3%. 12 subjects got credit rates of 40% or higher.

Students also had good performance in the 2012 Hong Kong Advanced Level Examination. Among the 67 students, 80.6% of the students attained the minimum entrance requirements for local three-year undergraduate university programmes. The average passing rate (attaining grade E or above) was 90.1%. The school attained higher passing rates in 12 subjects than the Hong Kong norms. The average credit rate (attaining grade C or above) was 34.2%. The school attained higher credit rates in 8 subjects than the Hong Kong norms.

Inter-school Activities and Awards Won

In 2011-2012, many students demonstrated excellent performance in territory wide competitions and learning events. One student was selected as a member of the Hong Kong Team to attend the Schools Interport Football Championships 2011 held in Macao and the team won the Second Runner-up. Two students were selected to join the World Rope Skipping Championships held in the United States and they also represented Hong Kong to join the Hong Kong Elite Rope Skipping Competition which was organized by the Hong Kong Rope Skipping Association, China and they won 8 Championships and 2 First Runners-up. Eight students joined the Inter-school Bird Race organized by the Hong Kong Wetland Park and the Agriculture, Fisheries and Conservation Department and captured both the First and Second Place Awards. Four students of the group were then invited to join the first Bird Watching Competition held in Shenzhen city of the Mainland China and won the First Place Award.

In the Hong Kong Speech Festival, our Chinese Team won 3 Second Places and a Third Place, and our English team won 4 Second Places and 4 Third Places. In the Yuen Long District Children & Youth Speech Competition, our students won the Silver Medal. Eight students were awarded the LAMDA Level 1 Award in Communication which was issued by the London Academy of Music and Dramatic Art. Three of them gained Distinction prizes and 5 of them gained Merit prizes.

In the National Hua Luo-geng Cup Mathematics Competition, our students were awarded 35 individual prizes which included 3 Gold Medals, 10 Silver Medals and 22 Bronze Medals. In addition, two teams gained Silver Medals and one team gained a Bronze Medal. Gold Award was gained in the Hong Kong Mathematics Creative Problem Solving Competition for Secondary Schools organized by the Education Bureau. 20 students joined the Hong Kong & Macao Mathematical Olympiad Open Contest organized by the Hong Kong Mathematical Olympiad Association, one student was awarded Gold Medal, 6 students awarded Silver Medals and 13 students awarded Bronze Medals.

In the Hong Kong Budding Scientists Award 2011-2012 organized by the Education Bureau, 1 student was awarded First Class Honour and another student was awarded Third Class Honour. Two teams of our students captured the Best Reporting Award and the Food Science Award in the Hong Kong Student Science Project Competition organized by the Innovation and Technology Council, the Hong Kong Federation of Youth Groups, the Education Bureau and the Hong Kong Science Museum.

Students continued to have good performance in visual arts. 11 students were awarded the Champion in the All Hong Kong Schools Mural Painting Competition. Five students joined the Poster Design Competition for the Hong Kong Mathematics Olympiad organized by the Education Bureau and four of them were awarded the Ten

Best Designers and one student was awarded the Second Place. Our students joined the "Star River" National Children's Fine Arts, Calligraphy & Photography Contest organized by the China Youth & Children Research Association and won the First Grand Award, Second Grand Award and Third Grand Award.

12 Champions, 18 First Runners-up, 34 Second Runners-up and numerous awards were received in various sports competitions including swimming, cross country running, rope skipping, badminton, football, volleyball, handball and basketball. Our students won the Girls' B Grade Group Champion, Boys' A Grade and Girls' A Grade Group Third Place in the Interschool Cross Country Competition (Yuen Long).



Sustainable Development Education

Our school continued to have outstanding performance in the promotion of education for sustainable development. In recognition of our school's efforts and contribution in sustainable development, we were granted Gold Award by the Council for Sustainable Development in Hong Kong. Moreover, 13 students were selected to join the UN DESD Hong Kong Award Scheme organized by UNESCO HK. The Project Report Award, the Board Display Award, the Grand ESD Award and the Excellent Award were captured by our students. Four students were selected to join the Caretakers Environment International Conference held in Holland.



Career Exploration Day

In order to raise students' awareness about the wide range of possible positions and fields of work, and to help students to begin to explore careers, and the criteria for success and advancement, we organized the Career Exploration Day every three years. This year, about 100 guests, including old students of QES, old students of our school and various community partners, came to our school on the Career Exploration Day to share their professional knowledge and valuable experience with our students.

Through-train

Starting from this academic year, our school operates under the through-train mode with our 3 other sister schools. About 64% of our S1 students came from our 2 QESOSA primary schools. Great effort has been given to help our through-train students transiting to secondary learning as learners' ability becomes more diverse under the through-train mode. With the concerted effort of all our teaching staff and the colleagues of our sister schools, smooth transition was achieved. Furthermore, a variety of student activities and learning programmes were provided for the primary school students to get more familiar with the curriculum of our secondary schools. About 87% of the second cohort of through-train P6 students of our 2 QESOSA primary schools opted to stay in our school. The high and increasing opt-in rate was very encouraging. It reflected the confidence that our primary school students and parents had towards our school and our School Sponsoring Body.

School Profile

In the seventh year of our school, we continued to herald renewed energy to sustain education practices and management policies that are both effective and nurturing. We have taken consistent and carefully considered measures to initiate ideas to address challenges that we, as a collective, must resolve with determination and harmony of spirit. We forge ahead with our most valued natural resources being our motivated students, professional staff and supportive parents with determination and courage to holistically educate our students who are the trustees of the future.



Class Structure

The class structure of the 2011-2012 school year is 4-5-5-6-6-2 from secondary one to secondary seven, making a total of 33 classes.

Staff Strength

Over and above the standard established staff number granted by the Education Bureau, we were able to strengthen our staff to 75 teachers. All teachers employed have their first degrees, 24% of the teachers hold higher degrees and 93% have been professionally trained. Moreover, all English teachers have attained the required language proficiency as stated by the Education Bureau.


Student-centered Curriculum Support

In consecutive cohort years, we have invested additional resources to enhance student learning outcomes. This included equipping our students to better prepare for the public examinations as well as to make informed choice for further studies. Moreover, Saturday school, various subject consultation weeks, mock interviews and multiple pathways information talks were regularly offered. Various engaging activities were embedded in our formal curricula to facilitate and extend learning outside the classroom, including designated English Learning Activity Day, Chinese Cultural Day and Science Exploration Week. We continued to provide afterschool homework tutorials and enhancement classes to sustain students' good study habits and enhance the school learning atmosphere. We introduced the merit system this year to recognize and affirm good behaviour and learning attitude. In addition, extended curricula, inclusive of the Nature Touch, the Circuit Run and interclass pastoral care competitions, were provided to train, develop and enhance good learning habits and sustainable academic performance.

Strategies to Improve English Attainment Level

We adopted a whole school approach to language learning and usage. We are further developing our students' proficiency in English usage by integrating and immersing students in English language as the medium of instruction in Mathematics and Geography in junior levels that further enriches

the English language environment. Additional Language Arts and Bridging Programmes are set in place to further develop the language ability of our students and meet their learning needs. English enhancement classes and overseas exchange programmes assist our students in their use of English as a meaningful language for national and international communication.







QESOSAEPO Schools - QESOSA TKW Secondary School

2011-2012 Highlights and Achievements

The results of the Hong Kong Advanced Level Examination of our secondary 7 students were encouraging this year. 61 students sat for the examination with a total of 14 subjects. More than 70% of our students attained the general entrance requirements for admission to tertiary institutions, which was higher than the rate of 58% for all day school candidates. The overall credit rate was 24% and 64 credits and distinctions were obtained with an overall passing rate of 91%. Amongst the A-level subjects, six subject areas had passing rate of 100%. Ho Yuk Nam was the best achieving student and got two A's and one C.

Outstanding Caring School
Award presentation

A total of 228 Secondary 6 students participated in the first Hong Kong Diploma of Secondary Education Examination. 25% of our students met the general entrance

requirements for local four-year undergraduate university programmes. The percentage of students obtaining level 2 and above in five subjects was 63%. Amongst the subjects, the percentage awarded level 4 and above was 21% and a total number of 276 credits and distinctions were obtained. The percentage awarded level 2 and above was 84% which was higher than the Hong Kong mean passing rate of 83%. The best student was Lo Yiu Ting who got one level 5**, one level 5*, one level 5, one level 4 and two level 3. Lo Wing Hei scored one level 5**, two level 4 and two level 3. These results reflect the great effort made by our students and teachers in the past six years.

It was a heart warming recognition to receive the Outstanding Caring School for Parent–School Cooperation Award presented by the Education Bureau and the Hong Kong Christian Service. Our continual focus is to have an inclusive and transparent relationship with parents' involvement and participation in school operation and decision making.

We are proud of being selected as one of the two pilot schools for the "Sports Legacy" Pilot Scheme launched by the Sports Federation and Olympic Committee of Hong Kong. Our students continue to demonstrate potential talent and steady improvement in their sporting skills and team synergy through their passion and strive for their goals.

The highlights for the academic year 2011-2012 reflected fairly the effort and diligence of students, learning coaches and teachers. Our students had strong performances in various subject disciplines during this academic year. They achieved remarkably in academic competitions, including the championship in the 64th Hong Kong Schools Speech Festival (English) and the Merit award in the Australian Writing Competition. The excellence awards received in Chinese language are the Best Debater in the New Territories Joint School Debate, the Best Performance in the Right Words Competition 2011, and the first and second runners-up in "Inherited Treasures" Chinese Writing Competition. In Mathematics, our students successfully gained distinctions in the University of New South Wales (Australia) Global International Competition and Assessment for Schools. Moreover, our students received the Hua Xia Cup China Mathematics Olympiad 2012 (Hong Kong Region) Honour second and third class awards. Senior science students won the Best Design Award for wind power in the Fun Science Competition and High Distinction award in the Australian National Chemistry Quiz. Our students are also the proud recipients of the "Tomorrow Leaders" Award and Sir Edward Youde Memorial Prizes.

In the arts and cultural domains, our student and parent team was awarded the first runner-up in the "Dulux Let's Colour Our School" Competition for accomplishing a wall mural with a kaleidoscope of colours in the playground. In addition, students received the first runner-up in the Hong Kong Schools Music Festival (Graded Piano Solo - Grade Five), the Championship in the "Primary Care, Family Doctor as Your Health Partner" Video Competition. The school dance and drama teams received the Silver Medal in the 40th Open Dance Contest, the Outstanding Awards in Stage Effect, Teamwork and Overall Performance in the Hong Kong School Drama Festival.

Our school sport teams have excelled in various sport codes and received accolades and championships that are listed below:

- Overall Championship in the Yuen Long District Inter-school Athletics Competition
- Overall Championship in the Yuen Long District Inter-school Cross Country Competition
- Championship in the Standard Chartered Marathon 101 Education Cup 10 km
- Championship in Junior Men's and Women's 5000 m in the Hong Kong Race Walking Competition
- Championship in the Sham Shui Po Touch Rugby Competition

Finally, gratitude must be expressed to our students, parents and staff for their co-operative spirit and commitment to student learning. As a school community, we are committed to enhancing academic outcomes, holistic learning platforms and a system of amicable communication for students, staff and parents to achieve this. 'Our greatest glory is not in never falling, but in getting up every time we do.'

「願春暫留,春歸如過翼,一去無跡。為問花何在?...多情為誰追惜?」


這個夢的上半段在2012年3月11日開始。

Professor Tam Ping Leung, Patrick (70FA)

Professor Tam is the Deputy Director and a Senior Principal Research Fellow, Children's Medical Research Institute and Professor, Discipline of Medicine, Sydney Medical School, the University of Sydney

In 2011, he was elected as a Fellow of the Royal Society of London for his research into cell fate and cell lineage in mammalian development. He also proved experimentally that mammalian germ cells arise by induction rather than segregation of germ plasm as in other species and showed that the mammalian organizer, which induces the body axis, varies in composition and inductive ability over time. These studies, and his many other contributions, are fundamentally important for understanding early embryonic development and origins of congenital malformations.

A photograph on NGC 253: The Sculptor Galaxy taken by Mr. Lau was posted by NASA as "Astronomy Picture of the Day" on 20 December 2011. Discovered in 1783, NGC 253 lies only about ten million light-years distant. NGC 253 is not only one of the brightest spiral galaxies visible, it is also one of the dustiest. Visible in the photograph is the active central nucleus, also known to be a bright source of X-rays and gamma rays.
